PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Romans 15:13 "Abounding in Hope" is our new theme for 2022-2023. Our Fall Annual Gathering on Sept 17, 2022 certainly gave us hope for NC USFW as we all came together at Centre Friends for a wonderful time of fellowship and sharing. Thank you to Centre Friends ladies for their hospitality, inspirational devotions and delicious lunch. The presentation by Friends Disaster Service provided us real life examples of how their work in the eastern part of the state has given hope to families still suffering after 3 years from Hurricane Florence.

We are also very appreciative of everyone who used the RSWR Gratitude Calendar for our coin ministry to support hunger relief. In the Spring we presented the RSWR Gratitude Calendar and coin ministry to help with hunger in Turkana, Kenya, Ukraine and other parts of our world. Our goal was to bring our coins back to the Fall Annual Gathering. If you did the calendar and placed your coins in the jar, it probably made you realize how much you had to be thankful for. Counting all the shoes in my closet, the light bulbs and electrical outlets in my house, then adding coins to my jar for each one, provided many coins in my jar. After the conference our Treasurer, Alicia Sharp gave me a total for our coin ministry. Thank you to everyone who participated and supported this ministry.

We were able to collect a total of \$1057.68 distributed as follows :

\$200.75 to Samaritans Purse for Ukraine

\$200.75 to FUM / Kenya for hunger relief and

\$656.18 to Right Sharing of World Resources (RSWR) for hunger relief.

When I looked back at my Gratitude calendar, there was one block that said place 1 cent for every year you haven't suffered a tornado, a hurricane, draught, flood or earthquake. It was a blessing to realize that I had not suffered a tragedy of this sort in my lifetime. This helped me understand why the calendar was titled the Gratitude Calendar. Many in Florida have not been so fortunate and suffered total devastation and death from Hurricane Ian in October. Our Friends Disaster Service told us about a woman and her child who had suffered loss from Hurricane Florence. The family had existed for the past 3 years in a shell of a home with floors rotting and spongy from years of moisture and decay. Friends Disaster helped restore what little they had left because it was all they had. Hunger for some families may be similar. When food is scarce because of drought, poverty or war, a few items of food may be all they

have. When we have more than enough, pray that the least of these can be filled with hope as we trust in God to help us know how to serve in the name of Jesus.

As part of our celebration of 350 years of Quakerism in North Carolina we joined the Cane Creek Valley Quaker Tour on Oct. 22, 2022.

The vision and planning of Lou Gordh at First Friends Meeting provided us a wonderful day of visiting and learning about three monthly meetings and three historical sites in Alamance County, N.C. Each of the meetings welcomed us with hospitality and interesting histories of their meetings. At one of the historical sites we were encouraged as we learned of plans to restart performances, hopefully this summer, at Snow Camp Outdoor Theater. Visits to two grist mills in the area revealed how farmers had a way to get their grain made into flour along Cane Creek over two hundred years ago. One of these mills was the site of a battle near the end of the Revolutionary War. Many thanks to Cane Creek, Spring, and West Grove Friends Meetings and the folks at Lindley and Guthrie Mills for a day of information and enjoyment.

Knowing our heritage and appreciating those who have gone before us has value. Considering the future of Quakerism is even more important. A concluding statement is found in Walter R. Williams's book, The Rich Heritage of Quakerism. The epilogue by Paul Anderson, "An Ongoing Heritage" states: "Friends do indeed have a rich heritage, and from it contemporary Quakers and others can learn a great deal. The true value of any heritage, however, lies not in its ability to induce a nostalgic reflection over the past, but in its ability to produce a redemptive difference in the present and the future. As Friends address these and other questions for a forward-looking people, new possibilities begin to emerge. Not only is the Quaker heritage more deeply appreciated, but it becomes a vital source of renewal. It becomes an ongoing heritage."

News from FEMAP-During the last four months over 700 kits have been distributed to 12 nonprofit organizations in the piedmont of NC with some given to a Christmas farm in Sparta, Va. Over 100 quilted blankets, 22 toboggans, gloves and socks were donated to sites needing these items. A BIG THANK YOU to all the meetings that continue to support this work at FEMAP.
